FROM PASTOR COLE...

Therefore, I will charm her, and bring her into the desert, and speak tenderly to her heart... and I will say... "You are my people." Hosea 2:14 & 23

For many of us, the last 2 years have been incredibly difficult. We have been forced to worship in different ways and places, forced to distance from those we love, forced to miss events and milestones. It has been hard. We have been in a wilderness or "desert" time.

The prophet Hosea knew about times like what we are experiencing. Hosea shared the verses quoted above after the most devastating period in Israel's history. They had been conquered by the Assyrian forces and many had been removed from their home. Their lives had been turned upside down. They had been forced to worship in different ways, distance from loved ones and missed important events and milestones — sound familiar?

What God spoke through the prophet Hosea to the desperate people was a word of hope. More than that, it was a tender, precious word from God for the people then and I think for us today as well.

God says that God will "charm" or "allure" the people, even as they found themselves in the wilderness. Even as life had changed forever. Even as they had been forced into so much of what they did not want.

What could that mean for our lives, that God wants to speak "tenderly" to us, even in this season? What would that even look like?

I do not know when this awful pandemic will end. I do not know when we will be able to fully return to worship and all the events we've missed so much. I am hopeful that is soon. The people of Israel had to wait a generation before life returned to a "new normal." I pray that is not the case for us, but however long it takes, we can be encouraged by this word from the Lord. Even in this place — this season that has been brutal and devastating — God wants to allure us, to charm us, to speak tenderly and remind us that we are the people of God. We are God's beloved children. God is still at work.

If I've said this once, I've said it a thousand times: this season is not a surprise to God. You have been called and gifted for **exactly** such a time as this. It is not easy, but God is with us so "who could be against us."

I am in prayer with you and for you as we continue to wonder through these challenging days. But take heart: God is calling to you, lovingly, tenderly. God is reminding you, today and always, that you are God's most precious child.

May you be the love of God in someone's life this month. May you feel God's love in your own life. May we all be "visited" by God's salvation again. Happy Valentine's Day!

FROM BETH BROWN...

Yes! You Really CAN Change-What to do When you are Spiritually Stuck

"The Testimony of a Transformed Life" Beth Brown - Lay Leader, February 2022

It is hard to believe we are already into month two of 2022. This will be my last article as your lay leader. It has been my privilege to serve this congregation over the past 3 years. I love my church family and believe there are other areas where I can serve. I appreciate your love and support.

We have reached the final piece of our Chip Ingram study, "The Testimony of a Transformed Life." Chip Ingram is a teaching pastor and CEO of Living on the Edge, an international teaching and discipleship ministry.

The non-Christian world raises many intellectual and philosophical objections to Christianity, but much of the dialogue about our faith in our society centers on character issues. Many people perceive Christians as judgmental and condescending. Some point to the scandals and corruption that have plagued the church and assume these incidents are typical-that if you scratch the veneer of Christianity, you find the same flaws, lusts, greed, and self-centeredness at the core of every person's life, whether they claim the name of Jesus or not. Many accuse the church leaders of ulterior motives in maintaining a profitable business, an exclusive club, or a system of power. A popular quote often attributed to Gandhi makes this point: "I like your Christ. I do not like your Christians. Your Christians are so unlike your Christ." All of these objections come down to one common element: the lack of real change in Christians' lives. The world can find plenty of evidence that many of us are not Christ like, and that evidence is magnified in the hands of those who reject our faith.

Think of the testimony we could have if those scandals, behavioral flaws, and mixed motives became rare exceptions rather than common observations and headlines. What impact would it have on our loved ones? Our society? Our government, schools, media, and community organizations? What if Christians became widely known as desirable friends, employees, and volunteers because of our humility, servant-heartedness, integrity, and love? What if we presented a clear picture of Jesus and demonstrated the power of a transformed life in ways that only our most strident critics could deny? What if we radically changed the way people see Jesus and His followers? We might actually turn the world upside down (again), and God might draw many to faith through us.

As it stands right now, believers can be as materialistic and greedy-and deeply in debt-as nonbelievers. Disturbing numbers of Christians are trapped in pornography and other addictive behaviors. The divorce rate among committed Christians is substantially lower than that among non-Christians, but it is alarmingly high. Those who claim the name of Christ know how to develop destructive habits, sabotage their relationships, and misdirect their priorities as well as anybody. But all of that can change. Transformed lives are contagious. We can become catalysts of change not only for Christian culture, but for society as a whole.

Committed, disciplined, transformed Christians are not perfect. If you are on the path of transformation, you know very well that we face many of the same kinds of struggles that everyone else faces, and sometimes we stumble, stagger, or fall. But we continue to grow because we recognize that Jesus owns our priorities, our time, our money, our relationships, our families, and our own selves. We make it our goal to thrive in marriage or singleness, raise kids, serve others, seek purity, maintain integrity, and live His way rather than ours. We may not be perfect at it, but we are growing in that direction.

Whenever you are on that spectrum from casual Christian to frustrated Christian to growing and changing Christian, you can learn the principles and tools of greater transformation. The statistics, problems, and frustration we've covered in this series do not have to be your story. We've introduced three hindrances to life change – spiritual ignorance, spiritual isolation, and spiritual myopia – as common pitfalls for all of us. But it is important to know from the outset, without a doubt, that you are not stuck in any of them. Paul identified some profound, practical truths in the fourth chapter of Ephesians that can change your life. Transformation really is possible, it is truly miraculous, and it is promised by God who loves you and has designed you to reflect who He is.

For a devotion this month I would suggest reading Ephesians Chapter 4. Living with Jesus as our priority offers an opportunity for a deeper relationship with Him. The exciting aspect of this is what changes it will bring to our lives, our relationships, and our faith. My hope is that Jesus will reveal himself to you through scripture, worship, the interactions with strangers, friends and family. This being the "love month", may you be blessed with the love of Jesus in abundance this month.

2022 Marriage Enrichment Retreat Registration Is Open

Martin uses emotionally focused therapy for couples, helping you better understand the psychology of successful relationships and guiding you through a series of conversations to help you draw closer to God and each other.

Marriage Enrichment Retreats for each couple combined are \$836, which includes the program, two nights of lodging at Lake Junaluska, five meals and access to Lake Junaluska's recreational amenities.

Hello everyone, my name is Marilyn Medford and I want to tell you about the Spring Mission Trip that I will be going on in May. I will be going to the Navajo Reservation to help distribute Food Boxes and Medical Supplies to the Navajo Elders. I will be meeting up with the Adopt-A-Native-Elder Program from Salt Lake City, Utah. The elders that we will be helping still live the traditional lifestyle, which many live without water or electricity. Their homes are located in a very rural area on the reservation. The nearest grocery store can be 75 miles or further away. The roads are not maintained and become impassable in the winter months. They also heat their homes and cook with woods. Wood is another thing that we help with, which is very hard to supply, and the cost is very high.

I am collecting the large carton of Quaker Oatmeal to give the elders that I will be helping, this item is what they eat each morning.

Cartons can be left with Belinda in the church office. If you cannot get out to purchase the Oatmeal you can leave your donation with Belinda and will be glad to purchase it for you.

I have brochures that give more information about what the program does for the elders during the year. I will leave on the table in the gathering area if you would like to learn more about this wonderful program.
